When Claude 0. Ervin left his boyhood home in the Mississippi Delta town of Ripley, Tennessee, in 1958; he was determined to make his way in life by serving mankind. That September, with only \$2 in his pocket, Ervin started his lifelong mission of giving back. Ervin joined the U.S. Air Force in 1958, serving more than 20 years before retiring. He became a human resources administrator at Baylor University, a post he held for more than two decades, and he remains an active member of his community in the Waco suburb of West
